### Jewish Attractions

1. William Breman Jewish History Museum  
- The Breman Museum in Atlanta is dedicated to Jewish history, culture and arts with special emphasis on Georgia and the Holocaust. Our Atlanta museum is the permanent exhibition *Absence of The Holocaust Years, 1933-1945*; the *Blonder Gallery* dedicated to Southern Jewish History; *Schwartz Gallery*, which hosts a variety of traveling and rotating exhibitions. The Museum Library and *Cuba Family Archives* add to our on-site offerings while *The Weinberg Center for Holocaust Education* provides a wonderful educational resource for students, teachers, and lifelong learners.

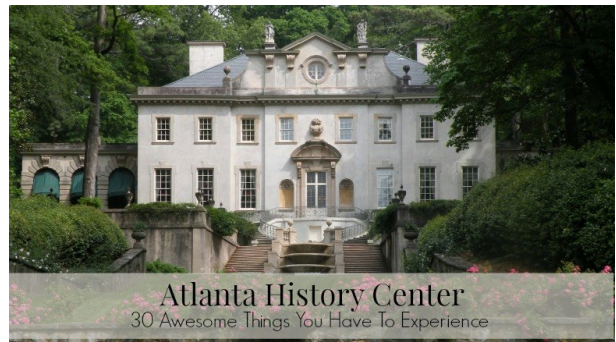
2. Anne Frank/Holocaust Museum (Sandy Springs) - Located just above the Sandy Springs Welcome Center, this 600-photograph exhibit with more than 8,000 words tells the story of young Anne Frank. The powerful, moving exhibit provides visitors a chance to learn, explore, share and remember the history and lessons of the Holocaust and its continued relevance today.

## Downtown

1. Skyview Atlanta - 20-story Ferris wheel in Centennial Park providing scenic views from climate-controlled gondolas.



2. Center for Civil and Human Rights - The Center for Civil and Human Rights is a museum dedicated to the achievements of both the civil rights movement in the United States and the broader worldwide human rights movement.
3. College Football Hall of Fame - The Hall features historic and contemporary memorabilia, interactive multimedia displays and activities and a theater featuring an ultra-high-definition film. This is a Hall of Fame Exhibit unlike any other, totally re-defining the way fans of any sport celebrate their Hall of Famers. Guests will be treated to a personalized experience in the Hall through 10 augmented reality displays where they can select video and images of players and coaches from their favorite school. 4. World of Coca-Cola - In 1886 a chemist named Dr John Pemberton devised a syrup designed to relieve headaches. 6. Centennial Olympic Park - Centennial Olympic Park is a 21-acre public park located in downtown Atlanta, Georgia owned and operated by the Georgia World Congress Center Authority. It was built by the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games as part of the infrastructure improvements for the 1996 Summer Olympics.
7. CNN Studios- The CNN Center is the world headquarters of CNN.



## Midtown

1. Atlanta Botanical Garden - The Atlanta Botanical Garden offers a lovely space with a variety of well laid out gardens. The Botanical Garden is a great place year round, with something always in bloom. <http://atlantabg.org>
2. High Museum of Art - Founded in 1905, the High Museum of Art has an extensive collection of 19th and 20th Century American art as well as significant European paintings and decorative art. The collection has also received the addition of modern and contemporary art, photography, and African art. There are currently Eric Carle, Basquiat and Vik Muniz exhibits. <http://www.high.org>
3. The Carter Center - Built in the '80s, the Carter Center and adjoining Jimmy Carter Presidential Library & Museum (collectively known as the Carter Presidential Center) sit on a 35-acre park east of Downtown Atlanta. The center, a nonprofit think tank affiliated with Emory University, is only open to the public by appointment or for special events, but the museum and library are open throughout the week.
4. The Museum of Design (MODA) - MODA is the only museum in the Southeast dedicated exclusively to the study and celebration of all things design. Formed in 1989 as the Atlanta International Museum of Art & Design, MODA has grown and evolved over the years to become the Southeast's only design museum. The museum also holds the distinction of being a Smithsonian Affiliate.
5. Ponce City Market for Dining options throughout the Central Food Hall, Shopping, Entertainment and amazing views of the city from the rooftop
6. Piedmont Park - This 189-acre crown jewel of Atlanta green space, home to the Atlanta Botanical Gardens and to summer festivals, also features jogging paths, basketball courts, dog parks, a farmers' market & more.
7. Fernbank Museum of Natural History - The Fernbank Museum of Natural History portrays the natural history of Georgia as well as technical and scientific phenomena with the aid of modern techniques. There's also a HUGE dinosaur statues at the entrance and the dinosaur skeletons in the Great Hall! There are many interesting rotating exhibits as well as an IMAX theater showing nature related movies, as well as an on-site Star Gallery. <http://www.fernbankmuseum.org>

## Outside Atlanta

1. Stone Mountain Park- Stone Mountain is an 863 foot high mass of exposed granite with a circumference of 5 miles. The top of the hill can be reached by cable car, and around it runs an old steam railway. Nearby is an artificial lake on which there are paddle-steamer cruises. Other features are a museum devoted to the early days of industrialization in the southern states, a Civil War Museum and a restored antebellum plantation. <http://www.stonemountainpark.com>
